ANNUAL REPORT 2023 FOR THE GENERAL CHURCH MEETING

Dear Members, Adherents, and Friends of St John's,

It gives me great pleasure to introduce this annual report of the life and work of St.John's Methodist Church, Potters Bar, for the Connexional year 2022/ 2023. I hope everyone associated with this church will read it with satisfaction at the amount of work that is done through this church. You will find on these pages reports from all the various church and non-church groups about their activities.

Not only does the annual report provide a valuable record of the church's life during the past twelve months or so, but it also reminds us of the broad range of our church work and witnesses from Jumping Johns to the Friday morning coffee and Bible Study & Prayer Groups etc.

Of course, even an annual report cannot record the whole picture. The Minister, Pastoral secretary, Pastoral contacts, and individual church members undertake a considerable amount of pastoral work within and beyond the family of the church. I firmly believe that pastoral care should receive the highest priority in the life of the Church and also to extend our pastoral care to all beyond the church walls.

As Minister, I am uniquely placed to survey the life of the church. What I see makes me feel very enthusiastic about the opportunities facing the church at present and the potential for developing the ministry and mission of the church.

I want to stress that the most significant resource that the church has is its people. We are fortunate in this church to have a core of committed new and old members with a variety of gifts to contribute. But I am also aware of the pressure under which many of the church families are living because of work and family commitments. Stress is a real feature of life at the present time. Securing volunteers for offices in any local church (or other charitable groups) is never easy. In view of this, the content of this report is cause for celebration rather than guilt at what cannot be achieved because of a lack of resources. In all our church work, to God be the glory.

CHURCH STEWARDS

First of all, let me express our sincere thanks to Myra Sloper for her commitment and care during the early part of this Connexional year which were very much appreciated and also thanks to our current Church Stewards Robin Burns, Helen Jeckells, David Carter and Sally Gunning and their continued leadership and commitment for which we are grateful indeed. Robin Burns has agreed to continue as senior church steward during the Connexional year and will step down at the General Church meeting in the summer 2024. That means we are looking for one or two more people to join the Stewards Team in September 2023 and 2024. If God calls you, please speak with one of the church stewards or me. Church Stewards Training will be given in autumn 2023.

The church stewards are corporately responsible, with the Minister in charge exercising pastoral responsibility in relation to the Local Church for giving leadership and help over the whole range of the church's life and activity. They are particularly charged to hold together in unity the variety of concerns that are contained within the one ministry of the church. To this end it is their responsibility to uphold and act upon the decisions and policies of the Church Council. In the discharge of their responsibilities, they are encouraged, whenever possible, to draw other (new and old) members with appropriate gifts and skills into a leadership team to be appointed by the Church Council.

WARM SPACE, BIBLE STUDY & PRAYER MEETINGS

Since last autumn, the church has been open on Tuesdays from 11 am to 4 pm for 'Warm Space' for anyone to come and have a time together over a cup of coffee and a light lunch which are very popular. We started Saturday morning prayers on Zoom from 9 am to 9:45 am and had a successful Lent Bible study on Zoom and in person, which were very well attended. The presence of church members on the premises during these times reminds those who use our facilities that this is a Christian Church to serve. I am grateful to those who give time once a week to open the church and make the necessary arrangements for the Sunday Worship, Coffee / Bible Study & Prayer meetings, other activities, etc. We need a few more volunteers to help. Please let the stewards know if you could help at least once a month.

REPORT FROM THE TREASURER FOR THE YEAR TO 31ST AUGUST 2022

The Church has three main funds, the General Church fund, Shenley Church fund and the Nursery Playgroup fund. From 1st September 2021 Shenley became a class of St John's so its finances must be included within the accounts produced for St John's.

1. General Church Fund

This fund is responsible for supporting the costs of Circuit ministry and the maintenance and repair of the Church buildings.

The main source of income is regular giving from the members and friends, and this includes the related Gift Aid reclaimed from HMRC.

Other key sources of income are:

- external lettings to local groups which have now recovered to the levels of the pre-COVID years.
- a contribution from the Baker Street setting of our Playgroup for use of the premises during their term times.

We were fortunate to receive a donation of £10,000 from the relatives of a deceased member, Mrs Rita Hayes; this is not subject to any restrictions on its use but will be used for training or outreach work rather than property projects.

The total income of £122,548 can be summarised as follows, along with comparative figures for the previous year:

The main recurring expense we have is our share of the Circuit Assessment; this is the cost of supporting the Circuit ministers, their manses and the funds which the Circuit must pay to support Methodism at District and National levels.

The big, one off, expense for the year was the replacement of some old single glazed windows in the Church and the main hall. This project had been anticipated for several years and reserves were built up to pay for the cost.

In addition, to improve the display of words and images two large TV monitors were purchased to replace the existing screen and back projection arrangement in the Church. These costs are shown under the heading of equipment.

We are fortunate that long term fixed price contracts for the supply of both gas and electricity were entered into in 2020 before the big price increases of 2022. This has meant that the energy bills are not quite the burden that they could have been. These fixed price contracts will continue until late spring 2024.

Our total expenses of approximately £143,228 can be summarised as follows:

There was an overall deficit of £20,680, but this is attributable mainly to the expenditure on replacement windows.

It has been necessary to use some of our reserves, including those held in designated and restricted funds intended for property related expenditure, to cover the cost of the replacement windows. At 31st August 2022 general fund reserves stood at £93,000. In accordance with Charity Commission guidance the bulk of this is held to cover at least 6 months of normal expenditure should elements of our income suffer a sudden decline. The balance is to cover other costs such as future property work including the replacement of the remaining old single glazed windows in the church.

2, Shenley Church fund

Shenley had the following transactions during the year and the balance of funds, or reserves, at the year-end was £16,918. The funds raised and donated locally more than covered the costs of running and maintaining the Church building during the year.

4. Nursery Playgroup Fund

The Playgroup had a very successful year financially achieving an operating surplus of approximately £45,000 probably one of the highest ever achieved. The overall financial aim of the Playgroup is to cover its costs year on year. This exceptional result can be explained to a large degree by a record number of pupils at the Oakmere School setting and it has been necessary to rent additional classroom space from the School.

The total income of the Playgroup for the year to 31st August 2022 was £362,000 compared to £283,000 in the previous year. The majority of the income, 88%, comes from pupil hours paid for by Hertfordshire County Council with the balance being paid by parents.

The major cost of the Playgroup is staff wages and related employment costs which represent 96% of total costs.

From September 2022 the Playgroup board, which reports to Church Council, has had to make significant increases to staff hourly wage rates to reflect both inflation and comply with statutory and Connexionally recommended minimum wage levels.

It is unlikely that the outstanding financial performance of last year will be repeated. Pupil numbers have been lower this year and along with higher wage costs this will impact adversely on the financial outcome for the current year to 31st August 2023.

The Playgroup maintains its own reserves which at 31st August 2022 were £155,000. These reserves are held to cover years when operating losses are incurred and for the payroll related costs which would be incurred if any part of the Playgroup had to cease operations at no or short notice. It should be noted that any costs or liabilities of the Playgroup which could not be covered by these reserves would fall as a liability of the Church's managing trustees.

Conclusion

The Church's finances remain in a satisfactory shape, and we are fortunate to have a large number of members and friends who contribute very generously to the work of the Church.

The church's formal accounts and trustees report will be presented to the Church Council, as Managing Trustees, for their approval. They will also be subject to an independent examination by a firm of accountants to comply with Charity Commission requirements.

CHURCHES TOGETHER IN POTTERS BAR REPORT 2022

A "Walk of Witness" took place on Good Friday. This was in a different format from previous years in that participants walked from their own churches to meet at the War Memorial for a short service.

There was a service at Our Lady and St Vincent Roman Catholic Church to mark the 20th Anniversary of the Potters Bar Rail Crash on May 10th 2022. This was well attended and was a very moving occasion.

A service to celebrate Pentecost and the Queen's Platinum Jubilee took place on the afternoon of Sunday 5th June. It had originally been planned as a picnic in Oakmere Park but as the weather was inclement, it was held at St Mary's in the Walk. The St John's worship band, led by Margaret Rhodes on keyboard, provided the music for the occasion and this contribution was much appreciated.

A very successful Holiday Club was held at Pope Paul School from 20-26th August for 5 mornings. Just over 60 children attended and there were 36 volunteers including 8 from St John's. The Teen Team (older children) did a great job supporting the adult volunteers. The theme was "Teambuilders-", and the children learnt about being on God's Team through songs, drama, activities, crafts and games. A lunchtime barbecue for the children and their parents finished off an enjoyable and worthwhile week.

A Churches Together in Potters Bar Service of Evensong in thanksgiving for Her Late Majesty Queen Elizabeth II was held at St Mary the Virgin and All Saints Church on Sunday 18th September. This was well attended with representatives from all the churches in the area and several clergy from various churches took part in the service.

"Discover Christmas" 2022 was again held at St John's with crafts and Nativity Drama. Feedback was very positive, but it was acknowledged that the children mostly came from church families. It was agreed that wider publicity should be employed next Christmas.

Saturday morning prayers, which take place on the first Saturday of the month at 8.30 am, are now attracting more people - there were 22 at the meeting on 1st October at St John's which was led by David Jebb. It is good to meet with Christians from the other churches in Potters Bar and share prayers and breakfast.

CIRCUIT REPORT FOR 2022

Stationing With the departure of all but one of our Circuit ministers at the end of August, the main focus for the Circuit Leadership Team (CLT) during 2022 was that of stationing. For financial reasons, the decision had already been taken to reorganise the Circuit and reduce the number of ministers from five to four. It was agreed that we would seek a new Superintendent Minister, a Probationer Presbyter and a Deacon to join Rev Andrew Prout on the ministerial team from September 2022. The Circuit was successful in filling all these posts, and Revs David Jebb, Rosemary Mutopo and Deacon Nigel Perrott were welcomed into the Circuit. From September, the CLT once again entered into the stationing process, following Andrew's decision to seek a new post for September 2023.

Appointments The Circuit also found itself with a number of other, non-ministerial vacancies to fill:

- 1. **Circuit Administrator** Chris Hancock took this role on, temporarily, following the tragic death of Ann Huntingford. Unfortunately, two attempts at recruitment failed to find a suitable replacement; but Chris agreed to remain in post until August 2023, after a review of his contract.
- 2. **Circuit Safeguarding Officer** A volunteer has recently been found for this role. The Circuit has four trained trainers for Safeguarding foundation level, but organising dates for training sessions has been proving difficult, especially during the Covid years. With a new officer in post, it is hoped that the process can now be restarted.
- 3. **Circuit Treasurer** Since September, Stuart Johnson (Senior Circuit Steward) has been dealing with the Circuit finances while a new Treasurer is sought.
- 4. **Manses Secretary** The Circuit was, and remains, in need of a volunteer to take this on. Members of SJPB kindly carried out the work during 2022, as there was much to do in preparing and updating accommodation for our new ministers.

Circuit Churches From September 1st 2022, Shenley Methodist Church became a class of St John's. At the same time, Digswell Village Church ended its LEP arrangement with the local Anglican Church and became a Methodist Church in its own right, although the two churches will continue in an Ecumenical Partnership.

Connexional strategies:

Strategies being looked at by CLT include:

- 1. New Places for New People "new ways of being church (Fresh Expression Church)". There is a need to identify where there may be opportunities for our churches to explore this initiative.
- 2. Equality Diversity and Inclusion (EDI)/ Justice, Dignity and Solidarity (JDS). The Circuit wishes to set up a group to look at these issues and form a Circuit Plan to help address them.
- 3. Circuit Outreach Mission, Evangelism, Family, Lunch and Youth (COMEFLY)

COMMUNICATIONS COMMITTEE

The communications committee looks after the general communications from the church – both internal and external. We meet every other month to discuss policy and plans. The committee consists of Rev David Jebb, Robin Burns, Chris Humphreys and Margaret Rhodes.

The main areas we manage are:

- Our website, <u>www.stjohnspb.org.uk</u>. (Chris) We work hard to keep this up to date but depend on others to let us know when things change! A recent addition is a monthly blog from our minister.
- Our newsletter, St John's News (Mags / Robin) This is produced monthly except in January and August. This is emailed to 69 people, and we usually print about 80 or 90 copies. There are two similar versions – one created in Apple software and one in Microsoft software – have you noticed the difference?
- Our emails (sent from info@stjohnspb.org.uk). Following some earlier technical issues we now use an Internet service run by Mailchimp to send and manage our church emails. This also allows users to subscribe or unsubscribe from our 3 mailing lists:
 - o Emails about events and activities aimed primarily at adults
 - Emails about events and activities aimed primarily at children
 - St John's News
- Our noticeboards (Mags). We have a range of noticeboards both external and internal, some for church use and some for other organisations that use our premises or community groups.

- Our screens (Chris). We have recently started showing rolling notices on screens in the main foyer and the Nursery Playgroup waiting area. It has taken a while to overcome some technical issues and the system is still bedding down. Once we are sure it is stable we will open this up to other groups that use our premises.
- Our Facebook page (David). Another new initiative which is still bedding down. David posts a range of notices and articles there.

As well as these, we produce flyers when appropriate, and send articles and information to Potters Bar Community News and the Circuit Methodist Reporter.

CREATIVE CHURCH - ACTIVITIES AND CELEBRATION

Our thanks to the Creative Activity Team for another year of crafts and cooking to support our Creative Church and Celebration.

Creative Church is on the 3rd Sunday of each month and the families arrive from 10.30am onwards. We start in the Rainbow Room with the Activities. A plan shows those arriving what is on offer and highlights the bible story and theme for the day. Normally there are 4 crafts which can include making, modelling, painting, decorating, sticking or colouring. There is also a cooking table which is always popular. There is enough time for participants to have a go at the cooking and craft activities. There is also a creche area for the very young. Refreshments are available during the morning too and thanks to Lesley for providing the snacks each month.

At 11.30am we get ready to join the service in church for the Celebration. This is where we tell the bible story and share what we have made, linking this to the bible story. Two related songs complete the Celebration. Thank you to the band for leading these and to the SongPro team and Don for putting the screen display together.

Creative Church has been happening for some time now and we have been able to recycle and update material from previous years. The main bible passage and theme can be used by the minister or preacher so there is a common link throughout the morning.

We are encouraged by the positive atmosphere in both the activity area (Rainbow Room) and in church which is helped by the support and encouragement from the congregation, so thank you.

We look forward to continuing this work as part of the outreach by St John's.

ENVIRONMENT

St John's has been keen to promote respect for the environment over many years. Accordingly, we have worked to obtain the Bronze Eco Church Award Certificate. Eco Church is supported by the Church of England, the Methodist Church and the United Reformed Church. This certificate covers aspects of church teaching, building energy efficiency, individual lifestyle choice and involvement with the community. To this end St John's also has a published Environmental Policy which corresponds with the Methodist Church overall policy.

The church team have looked hard at the building. Most of the easily achievable energy saving targets have been met and further savings require significant capital expenditure. As a check we have compared our church building with St Charles the Martyr who had recently completed an environmental audit. Their conclusions generally corresponded with ours.

There are still improvements to be made. Some of these are in hand with the Monday Fix It group. Improvements in hand are relatively minor upgrades to building insulation and modifications to the rainwater drainage to recover water for garden watering. These modifications may enable us to achieve an Eco Church Silver award.

We also have an exercise in place to study the temperature gradient in certain rooms. Study of these results will allow us to optimise setting of the room heating system. At present the interim results suggest certain undesirable effects but the results need to be studied in full before firm conclusions can be drawn.

As to the future, we should continue to encourage our membership and others in the church community to have due regard for environmental issues, specifically the carbon footprint of individual people. Any major developments await evolution of the Government energy policy. Currently gas heating is the best financial option and change to alternative system must show a running cost saving in order to justify it.

Heat pumps and Photovoltaic cells are in the future. The church roof arrangement is quite complex and may preclude economic use of PV cells. Currently heat pumps are expensive and do not show a saving in running cost. However, the trend of history is towards reduction of our carbon footprint so the situation may change in the future.

LENT BIBLE STUDY COURSE 2023 - 'Jesus 'The I AM'

This year's Lent Course has been based on the book 'Jesus 'The I AM' written by Margie Williamson and Benjie Shaw. Having sent for the book, I saw we were covering 8 'I AM' sayings and each saying has 5 separate sections to read and ponder beforehand. The course aimed to pick out key points from these sections, as time prevented covering every aspect.

When we were first invited to sign up for this course, I was undecided whether to join the Zoom sessions on Wednesday evenings organised by Revd David Jebb or come to the face-to-face meetings on Thursday mornings at St. John's, led by Rev. Gareth Powell. In the end, being free, I decided to do both and have felt that, for me, it has been the most inspiring experience.

Each session, whether on Zoom or at St. John's, has taken either one or sometimes two together, of Jesus' great 'I AM' sayings, to study and discuss largely through the words of St. John's gospel.

We started with combining 'God is the I AM' and 'Jesus I AM the Bread of Life' and concluded with 'I AM the Resurrection and the Life. The two ways of studying complimented each other, each bringing a different perspective and I was pleased I could visit both.

The Zoom study was joined by people from around the circuit and included visual aids, some beautiful songs, pieces of music and videos prepared by the leader. We were put into break out groups 2 or 3 times during each session to discuss certain questions from the book. Breakout sessions can be daunting for some people but, generally they worked well despite some challenging questions.

Although the pattern was reversed for the last 2 sessions, initially the Zoom "I AM' study was followed by the same study the next morning, with the Rev. Gareth Powell, adding a further deep thought-provoking dimension. For an hour, and never has an hour gone by so swiftly, he kept me completely focused on every word. I think I can say the others present felt the same, as he led us through the "Jesus I AM' studies with sincerity, conviction and some excellent light-hearted observations.

I would like to thank Revd David Jebb and everyone who worked to make these studies so meaningful and enjoyable as we went through 'the bright/sad season' of Lent (a quote from my Lectio 365 app for nighttime prayers) to Easter Day when we celebrate Jesus Christ and 'I AM the Resurrection and the Life'

The Outreach Committee is not a social committee, however it will use social events to encourage casual visitors to come and understand our faith. The Potters Bar Carnival is a case in point. We intend to create a stand this year which has items of interest for the average visitor and include features of evangelism such as a new course, 'Alpha for All'.

The future is in our hands and with prayer and discussion we will find the way ahead.

RESOURCES COMMITTEE

Since our last report in 2020 we have become the Resources Committee with the added responsibility of our IT provision and response. This is added to the issues of Property, Finance and Employment that we already held. Along with Church Council, we have also had to take on responsibilities for Shenley who have become a 'class' of St John's due to their low numbers.

Very importantly we express our gratitude to the Monday Morning Fix-It group and to all who have worked at other times and contribute so much to the upkeep of our buildings and gardens. Numbers attending have dropped in recent months due to moves away and increasing age and the responsibilities are falling on a decreasing pool of ability. A more detailed report of their work is elsewhere but any new faces who can contribute to the progress or the fellowship will be most welcome.

Health and Safety

The COVID pandemic produced a lot of additional work for this area which was handled mainly by Myra Sloper, as Senior Steward, Chris Humphreys as Lettings Secretary with help as needed for Risk Assessments and coping strategies. We lost significant Lettings Income equivalent to about a year.

Regular testing of gas system, fire alarms, emergency lighting, fire extinguishers, lightning conductor and electrical safety have all taken place as required by legislation with remedial works as needed. The five yearly inspection and test of the main electrical system was completed with almost no corrective work required.

A revised Health & Safety Policy and Fire Risk Assessment were both progressed and approved by Church Council. Shortly after this we received a short notice inspection by the Fire Brigade of our building and systems which we passed easily. Their only suggestion was to centralise the electronic holding of all safety related documents away from the Church Building, so that they could be accessed following a major incident to prove that we did follow all legal requirements. This has been done using the Church "Dropbox" system.

First Aid and Fire Training will be repeated this summer.

Building Report

Following the 2020 Quinquennial Inspection we needed to look at three main areas.

- The <u>Car Park surface</u> which had become hazardous and impossible to continue patching was replaced at a cost of just under £8,000
- After careful thought the lower-level metal <u>Critall windows</u> in the Worship Area, Minister's Vestry, Stewards' Vestry, and Minister's Toilet, along with the windows on the far side of the Main Hall were replaced with double glazed upvc at a cost of £26,430. Only the Main Hall windows are expected to deliver a meaningful saving to our heating costs. The heating of the other areas is so sporadic, and particularly the losses through the Worship Area roof are such that there will be little difference. The decay of the Worship Area upper windows was not as great but these will need to be changed within a few years.
- Roof expenditure has dropped, but some continuing work will be needed. More of the capping stones to the parapet walls will need to be done later this year.

At the time of the Clifton Room extension, we had the surface of a number of <u>bricks</u> re-faced due to erosion. There is now a number of other bricks in similar condition and this will be looked at during the summer and quotes are soon to be sought, having been delayed by COVID. There are also some areas of pointing that need to be replaced. Total cost may be in the region of £5,000 to £8,000.

Other works

- Redecoration of the areas affected by the window replacement continues. The two side aisles of the church have been completed but the band area and vestries are now in progress by Fix-It.
- The Scouts paid for various works to the Scout Hut including external decoration.
- Fix-It replaced all the pointing to the flagstones in the Courtyard Garden.
- The doors between the table store and Rainbow Room have been replaced and insulation to the store has been enhanced to reduce what we consider to be a significant heat loss in a part of the building which is well used.
- Other upcoming work includes further redecoration of the rainwater downpipes to the Worship Area and Hall. Replacement with plastic will be considered which will then reduce maintenance considerably.

The next Quinquennial Inspection is already due next year!

Contents and Technology

This has been a busy period.

- The Worship Area projector has been replaced with two new super-bright led screens again by the Fix-It group which has been very successful. Cost was less than £5,000.
- Two new Information Screens have been fitted in the Foyer and the area where parents wait to collect their Nursery Children. Cost has been less than £1,000. The system repeats notices from Sundays and other information to increase our reach to those who use our premises. The screens turn off at night.
- The photocopier has been replaced on a new contract which better reflects the lower usage now that the Marlborough Rd magazine is printed elsewhere.
- There have been a number of problems with the sound system due to data interference, and a new equaliser is in the process of being fitted.
- The computer used for worship has also been replaced with a laptop following a couple of awkward failures!

We are currently investigating the provision of a new Nativity display for the front Vestibule window, which is larger, better lit and more striking.

Environmental Issues

There is a separate report on this work which is now led by David Carter. We achieved the milestone of a Bronze level Eco Church award which was very close to Ali's heart which, due to everything that was already in place, was relatively straight-forward. We are now working to see if a Silver Award is within our reach – but this will be more of a challenge. Significantly, all our works are now looked at with regard to the effect on the environment.

Oakmere Nursery Playgroup – lease

Negotiations for a new lease with Hertfordshire County Council at Oakmere School for the Oakmere Nursery have been particularly slow and difficult, and the requirements of the local school have now changed again. It is hoped that this can be resolved finally by the summer.

Lettings

Due to the work of our Lettings Secretary we have recovered from the losses which were a result of COVID and income is back to the original level, although some of the users have changed – sometimes more than once. Chris does a very good job in this respect and the Committee is aware of the way in which some of the needs can occur suddenley and at awkward moments.

Staff

Sadly, we said farewell to one of our cleaners, Debbie Hunt, who moved out of the area last summer. Debbie also helped with our flower arranging and provided first class help with both of her duties. We will miss her.

We are pleased to welcome Julie Fidler who now joins Sarah Dicker on our team.

IT and Data Issues

A number of issues needed to be addressed before the new annual return to the District could be signed with regard to Data Protection. A significant issue has been resolved during this year by the people connected with St John's all being placed on a single central list from which all other lists are derived. This makes updating and certification much simpler. All those on the list have also been invited to reconfirm the accuracy of the data held.

A new Wi-Fi access code has been introduced for the church building in line with the General Data Protection Regulations, and to improve security everyone using the code is now required to agree that they will not pass on the password to anybody so that we are aware of who is using the system.

Shenley

Responsibility for the building and finances now sits with the SJMC Church Council. The local members asked for help when they received notice of a fire brigade inspection in the autumn. We managed to get this deferred by a couple of months which gave time to deal with the various issues which needed improvement. In this time a Fire Risk Assessment was obtained, a Health & Safety Policy was approved, the smoke detectors were replaced (only 2 of 5 were working), an emergency lighting system was installed, and the overdue gas inspection was completed. The local members have now appointed a "Responsible Person" as required by the regulations for Fire Risk management who is John Sterland. PAT testing remains outstanding.

The hall and other areas have been decorated in the past two years and there is a need to replace the hall carpet and attend to pointing and loose bricks in the wall with the adjacent property. The external noticeboard has been refurbished.

There is an issue with the licence for the adjacent house to utilise some of the church outside space as additional garden – which is being progressed.

We bring to prayer any concerns we have and share these. If you have a concern, you would like prayers for and cannot join the meeting, please write your prayer request and hand to us in person or by email, and we will do so. Confidentiality is always kept where requested.

Prayer isn't meant to be an afterthought, a last resort when nothing else has worked. It's meant to be your guiding star, the most crucial conversation of your day. Prayer is your conversation with God and how you can develop a personal, meaningful relationship with the God of the universe who loves you.

Prayer is important for St John's church or any other church because it helps us be aware of the spiritual forces at work in the congregation and outside the church. Every local church must be united in unceasing and intercessory prayer, as there is much power in united prayer. Prayer reveals to us the heart and mind of God.

Sometimes it feels like our lives are rushed and overwhelmingly busy with life and the church's business. We often find it hard to find the time for rest or renewal in God's presence since our attention is constantly moved by responsibility and needs. SCOUT GROUP - 4th POTTERS BAR

The 4th PB is a uniformed Scout group which is sponsored by the Church. It consists of three Sections – Beavers (6-8), Cubs (8-11) and Scouts (11-14), which meet at St John's on three consecutive nights during term time. Helping the Sections is the Executive, who provide control, and raise extra money through events such as Jumble Sales, Christmas Market and Quiz evenings.

We are still the largest group in the district. Although numbers vary, there are around 100 children (boys and girls), teenagers and adult members meeting on a regular basis, and there is usually a waiting list for all the Sections. All the leaders and Executive members are volunteers.

Chris Sullivan heads up the Beaver Section which meets early on a Friday night. The regular programme has badge work as well as games. Melissa Norton is acting Akela for the Cub Section after Sarah Munn took a sabbatical earlier this year. This section follows on from Beavers, with more challenging badge work and activities. Dick Waterhouse, helped by both daughters and several young leaders, runs the Scout Section.

As well as weekly meetings, there are many opportunities to camp and enjoy outdoor life – some examples are Camping at Lees Wood, Phaesels Wood and Tolmers. The Green Beret and Fire & Ice are winter camps for Scouts. Lochearnhead is a Scout Training Centre in Scotland, which gives opportunities for more challenging outdoor activities, and will soon be open again after recent refurbishment.

Although this is a successful Group, we should be aware of challenges. Foremost there is the staffing situation, which is a constant concern. We have been extremely lucky to recruit some new (and younger) members to run these large Sections, but personal circumstances can and do change.

We have been fortunate to raise extra cash though events like the Jumble Sales, Spring Fair, Christmas Market, and Quiz evening as well as some smaller events. It is our policy to keep camping and term fees affordable and fund raising is therefore essential. It is wonderful that St John's provides us with light, heat and shelter and tolerates noise, jumble and wet tents on the Stage. (We do try, through an annual voluntary donation to the Church, to offset the cost of the heat and light we use!)

We do greatly appreciate the support and encouragement of the Church and its individual members, in enabling us to continue with this valuable work with so many young people - thank you!

Worship

Sunday mornings

We regularly have half a dozen or more in the congregation. Being able to welcome preachers from around the Circuit is a joy and not something that we take for granted. It is much appreciated that local arrangement is kept to once a month, however it is a good opportunity for everyone to join in on these occasions. Local arrangement often takes the form of cafe church due to the flexible nature of the worship area.

Margaret Dalziel continues to give generously of her time so that our singing endeavours are guided by the organ. She is joined by John Southey on keyboard and Richard Webster on a variety of recorders.

Sunday afternoons

Having been started by our then youth worker Tracy, Messy Church meets at SMC on alternate months. The average number of children attending is now 30 and there are over 50 as members. It is also usual for both parents to attend.

This success has been achieved in no small part by the incredible work put in by Heather Moir. As one of our congregation she took on the task from Tracy and continued to keep in contact and deliver crafts to families throughout COVID and organised every session whilst St Martin's Church had their interregnum and for some time after the installation of the new vicar.

Outreach

Fellowship

A monthly fellowship meeting continues to be provided for seniors by Yvonne Perry. It takes the form of a talk or activity followed by a time to socialise over coffee and cake.

Lunches, usually twice a year, are also popular with this group. They show their appreciation by raising money for charity on these occasions, Mercy Ships was the last recipient.

Shenley Village Fête

The church feels that it important to have a stall each year to reinforce our presence in the village. It offers a good opportunity to engage with locals and visitors. The church has also benefited from grants awarded from monies raised by the fête.

Finances

We are very thankful to Robert Ward for taking on the work of treasurer. Our congregation gift mainly to the church online.

With fewer members of the congregation our fund-raising efforts for the church are limited to two sales a year. A Plant Sale in May and another general sale in the Autumn.

Lettings continue to generate income and also maintain the church as a community hub. Groups which meet regularly are :

Rainbows, the Women's Institute, Parish Council run board game group, Fete committee and Craft group

Ecumenical

A joint Bible study group with St Martin's Church meets fortnightly.

A soup lunch is held as part of a series organised by St Martin's throughout Lent. The money raised this year will be forwarded to the Fund for Human Need.

We continue to host the Easter Sunrise Service in the Walled Garden of Shenley Park. This has been attended by members of churches throughout the Circuit and many neighbouring Anglican churches. The collection is sent to an external charity.

Maintenance

Day to day maintenance is undertaken by Yvonne Perry who also oversees many of the lettings. John Sterland has volunteered to deal with property matters, renovating the notice board amongst other things.

We are grateful to St John's for practical help in the recent upgrading of our security lighting.

The community room was decorated last year and new flooring will be laid in the coming months. Both of these being gifts in memoriam.

The organ was recently serviced. Our thanks to John Southey who is ensuring the best conditions for its future functioning.

There is a problem with the heating which is being addressed.

TUESDAY WARM SPACE MEETINGS

During the autumn of 2022, the rising costs of living were beginning to worry people everywhere. We at Potters Bar Gems W I, wanted to help the community if possible.

The Hertsmere Community Officer, Antonia Mori made herself known and offered funding to start up a Warm Space. At the same time the Methodist Church asked that all churches should consider if they could offer a warm space. After discussions it was decided to use the facilities at St John's Methodist Church and offer a warm space on Tuesdays.

Leaflets were designed, printed and displayed in shops, cafes, supermarkets, chemists and Residential Homes in the area.

Coffee is served in the lounge from 11:30am, a simple soup, roll and cheese lunch, followed with fresh fruit and drinks is served in the dining room from 12:30. We ask for a donation of £2.50 to cover costs but if folk are unable to contribute, that is not a problem. Coming to meet others and share a meal together is far more important. In the afternoon dominoes, draughts, Jenga and other games are available as well as knitting, card making etc. Tea and cake are served in the afternoon before we all go home.

To date we have 11 members of St John's congregation and 13 members of the Potters Bar Gems WI helping on a rota, with 59 guests joining us over the last 5 months. Most weeks now we have between 22 and 27 people for lunch, after a slow start in November. Some just come for coffee and a chat.

There is always a warm welcome, plenty of chatter, lots of smiles and quite a bit of laughter each week. A few have met up with old school friends or colleagues not seen in ages! Several guests have commented that they have enjoyed the company and especially sitting down and sharing a meal, rather than always eating on their own, as we had to during COVID! Originally the project was to last until the end of March but now, because the group wants to continue to meet, we will go on until the end of June, not meet in July and August and start up again in September. It has also decided that we needed to change the name, so in future we will be known as the Welcome Space. New leaflets are being designed and will soon be distributed to replace those in the local shops etc.

Antonia Mori has just encouraged us to mark the King's Coronation by putting on a special Celebration Meal on Tuesday 9th May.
